LATEST UPDATES



We wanted to keep you informed as to the situation of how the Coronavirus is affecting Zimbabwe. Lockdown started on the 28th March 2020. Schools were closed, access across borders was restricted and there are no international flights.

Indications so far are that this has been effective in Harare and other urban centres, but how effective it will be in the rural communities is still not known. So far there have been 32 cases of Covid 19 and 8 confirmed deaths. The isolation hospitals dealing with these patients are far from adequate and have been in a poor state for some time due to shortages of drugs and equipment.

We know that at least 50% of the Zimbabwean population needs food aid. There is a fear amongst the people, that if the virus spreads around the country, their malnutrition will make them less able to overcome the virus.

Added to this is the problem of water supply. Many people rely on communal boreholes which means queuing, which brings about problems of social distancing. With inadequate water supply and financial limitation of buying items like soap for washing hands, will be a problem. So far there are no recorded cases at Mutemwa. Visits and pilgrimages have been stopped and it is hoped that the community and patients will remain isolated from this virus.

Despite the world not having been in this kind of situation before in recent history, we know that Zimbabweans as a whole have a remarkable record of overcoming seemingly impossible odds. With the help of John's intercession for not only Mutemwa, and Zimbabwe, but also for our own families and friends across the globe, we can get through this together.

LEPRA

There is growing concern that leprosy is re-emerging in Southern African countries and the governments, NGO's and private health staff no longer have the knowledge and expertise to properly identify and treat the disease.

Lepra is providing skills, knowledge and expertise to the staff at Mutemwa. They are using a combined approach of active case finding, health worker training to improve the diagnosis and treatment of people affected by leprosy, with mental health support and manufacturing specialist footwear. Following Lepra's visit to Zimbabwe in June 2019, a shipment of specialist footwear was recently received at the Centre, providing tailor made protective footwear for those individuals affected by leprosy. We are hugely appreciative for Lepra's ongoing support of our community at Mutemwa and hope that this partnership will go from strength to strength.



WORLD DAY OF PRAYER 2020

This year we had a special interest in the World Day of Prayer on 6th March. The worship service for that day is developed by women from a different country each year, and in 2020 the country was Zimbabwe.

Even more relevant for the JBMS was the chosen theme: 'Rise! Take up your mat and walk' - spoken by Jesus as he cured a sick man. As our mission is to look after the needs of those still suffering in Mutemwa, Zimbabwe where John Bradburne worked, we felt a special affinity with those words, and with the aspirations of people all over the world who prayed together on that day.

As most people are aware, the situation in Zimbabwe is currently extremely grave, with food in very short supply and lack of enough rain water and a severe shortage of electricity and fuel. To take up another of Jesus' sayings, in the Sermon on the Mount, we therefore feel we should 'go the extra mile' and make a special effort to help safeguard the community in and around Mutemwa at this very difficult time.

We were hugely grateful to those parishes and individuals who gave generously to JBMS for the World Day of Prayer, we raised £854 from your donations alone. This will go a long way in supporting our community in Zimbabwe. Thank you.

"I bought a family size bottle of Coca Cola and a bottle of brandy at the local store together with a box of provisions. I found John in his hut, in which he had built his tabernacle. It consisted of all sorts of 'junk', about six foot high as I remember, and looked remarkably unstable. In the centre was a picture of the Virgin Mary, mother and Child. There were two sticks forming a cross within the structure.

We spent some time walking through the leper colony, during which John enthusiastically introduced me to several of the lepers, speaking in a mixture of Shona and English. Looking back on it, I could see that he was entirely at one with each of them.

After that we took some food, I had brought with me, the Coca Cola and the brandy, and climbed the hill behind John's hut. He called it Mount Ararat, as written on his letter to me, not one which the local post office would have recognised!

At the top, we sat down for quite some time as I remember, perhaps the whole afternoon, we talked, we sang, we recited poetry, we ate and we drank, we solved the problems of the world."
